The WHR has been used as an indicator or measure of health, fertility, and the risk of ...

Bust/waist/hip measurements (informally called "body measurements" or "vital statistics") are a common method of specifying clothing sizes. They match the three inflection points of the female body shape.

Vertical torso measurements, which include the back (neck-waist) length, the shoulder-waist length (not the same as the back length, due to the slope of the shoulder), the bust-shoulder length, the bust ...

A female character's physical proportions are usually measured using the B/W/H ratio. B/W/H stands for Bust-Waist-Hip, it measures the circumference of these three sizes in centimeters or inches, and is ...

Female figures are typically narrower at the waist than at the bust and hips. The bust, waist, and hips are called inflection points, and the ratios of their circumferences are used to define basic body shapes.

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
